

Conflict and Peace

As you may know, I had the privilege, in my work, to travel to many African countries. I visited Khartoum in Sudan and enjoyed the company of church members, going to their homes and walking around the city. It was peaceful.



On April 15th, fighting broke out in Sudan between two generals, one Army and the other the leader of

a military unit, the RSF. Just two men fighting for power and control. The conflict that broke out has killed hundreds of people, sent more than 200,000 into neighbouring states, displaced another 700,000 inside the country, and many are the most vulnerable, women and children.

For civilians, the conflict has unleashed a nightmare of bombardment, random gunfire, home invasions and looting, flickering electricity supply, shortages of water and food, and little chance of medical help with injuries.

It makes me almost weep at the senselessness of this conflict; the impact it has on the innocent people. The destruction of a nation. Think too of more than one year of the war in Ukraine. Why? What does this achieve except harm and distress to the people?

These are conflicts impacting nations, but conflict can exist in every walk of life; at home in the family, between friends, at work, in the community. Unresolved conflict has long lasting impact on all.

It is noteworthy that world religions value and promote peace.

When conflict arises, finding time to talk, to see the other's perspective can avoid the situation escalating. Listening to each other, having an attitude of forgiveness and wanting reconciliation builds peace and de-escalates the rising conflict.

The reality is that our behaviour is not dependent on the behaviour of someone else. When things get tense between two people or groups, you have the freedom to choose your own response. You can choose to repay meanness with kindness and rudeness with gentleness.

Talking of clearing up, one of our most pressing challenges now that summer is on its way is the rate at which the grass in the churchyard grows! We have help with the field out the back (which will be all graves in the fullness of time) by the company that cuts the grass for the school. But, not surprisingly, they are a bit wary of thundering around on big gang-mowers over memorial plaques, and they can't get between graves, so we have somebody different doing that bit. But the areas at the front of the church, around the old graves, is very tricky to keep looking good, so we are struggling a bit for both volunteers and time. We have decided that once The Heap is gone (watch this space!) we will have a couple of large, properly contained, compost heaps over on the North boundary, for people to put their dead flowers etc in, and for grass cuttings and so on. The bin for all plastic/non compostable waste will be signposted more clearly. We have also thought about just how very soggy the ground got with all the rain a month or so ago, and are planning to plant some "thirsty" trees and bushes to help absorb some of the rain and run off from the hills. Fingers crossed...

The UK Environment agency report that Air pollution today remains the single biggest environmental threat to health in the UK, shortening tens of thousands of lives each year. Even during the industrial revolution, the Victorians realised that parks would provide cities with "lungs".Second is Noise pollution, which is surprising to many of us. But Noise pollution has been linked to sleep disturbance, severe chronic annoyance, coronary heart disease, metabolic health outcomes, such as diabetes and obesity and disruption to children's learning and development.

Both April and May have been manic as we have had to cram in so many rearranged games due to the cancellations during a dry but frozen winter, and a very wet spring. Given the unsure start to



the season having lost our entire first team squad and management team, together with the reserve team manager, the club has enjoyed a successful season. The first team had to rebuild under the management of villager Kev Pollard and Jamie Johnson, who together steered the team to a creditable mid table finish. Young 18 year old goalkeeper Ashton Trott picked up the most appearances, playing 30 games and kept a creditable 8 clean sheets. Joe Beardwell was the star in front of goal, scoring 18 goals in 19 appearances. Operating under the FA pyramid system, Wick Sports Ground must undergo certain redevelopment to allow future progress, for which full planning permission is now in place.
