

#### When does Spring start?

I am sitting writing this watching pairs of birds flitting in and out of the hedge, some daffodils have emerged, buds are forming on the trees. So Spring is nearly here.

Considering the astronomical Equinoxes, the arrangement of the planes of the orbit of the Earth and its equator are such that the planes intersect at two times, the Equinoxes; Spring starts at the Vernal Equinox around 20th March.

But more simply, our year is divided into 4 seasons of 3 months-Dec, Jan AND Feb is Winter- so Spring starts on March 1st. Traditionally Spring is when we have a good clean of the house and home. Warmer weather, opening doors and windows, shaking the carpets to get rid of the dust, accumulated over Winter. Spring is also a time of change and new life

This reminds me that in the church and some other faiths, Spring is a time for prayer and fasting; it is a time to examine our lives and think of what needs to be cleaned out or changed, ready for the year ahead. In the church we call this time Lent and it leads to the glorious time of celebration, remembering Easter, when Jesus Christ died for us all and then rose again to give each person the opportunity for new life and life eternal in relationship with Him.

You may be wondering what Easter is about? Come and join in the services at the church or chapel. In March and April before Easter, we will be meeting at the chapel on Tuesday evenings for some discussions on "Encountering God in everyday life". Come along if you have questions. The road safety campaign to decrease the speed of traffic going through the village has several parts to it: to put up signs (vehicle activated) to show drivers their speed, and also to increase driver awareness of the drop in speed limits as they approach the residential area - the drop from 50 to 40 is mostly observed, but they seem to not realise the drop from 40 to 30, so more "gateposting"

to make it much more visible and obvious is suggested.

Plus, in order to be able to get across from the Rose & Crown to the doctor's surgery, a "Puffin" crossing (like a "Pelican" crossing, but with the pedestrian lights on the same side, as opposed to the opposite side of the road) is proposed.

The public meeting to discuss this was held last month, so fingers crossed!

# **News from your Parish Council**

- Wick Sports Ground: WSG Committee has nearly completed phase 1 of works to refurbish the clubhouse, car park, hot water system and update safety features. (*It looks great! – Ed*). As guardian of WSG, the PC has contributed £15k towards these works. Phase 2 works in 2025 will include updating the changing rooms and corridors plus extra fire safety works.
- Village Hall: the car park was resurfaced to a high standard at the end of January. White lining to assist parking will be added in due course. The cost £22,685 + VAT (reclaimable) was funded by the Parish Council. The hall committee is currently assessing further improvements for 2025.
- Village Hall Committee: daily hire rates have been reviewed recently. The hall made a financial loss in 2023 and 2024 though that includes one-off exceptional legal costs, and substantial rises in energy costs some of which will be offset by the solar. The hall must pay for itself operationally. Hourly running costs are calculated to be £14.03. Thus, weekday rates at £15 are deemed fair. Weekend rates carry a premium at £25. The last rate increase was two years ago and there are no plans to change rates currently. The committee are working to generate a financial buffer/small surplus to fund ongoing repairs, update facilities and redecorate the interior.
- SGC Local Plan: the latest version of this controversial plan, including December's changes by government to the National Planning Policy Framework, will be out for consultation shortly. Local house building targets have changed to net, about 10,000 new homes on the eastern fringe of Bristol. The PC will discuss this at the March meeting. If you have any concerns about the impact of this plan, particularly the building in the green belt and the inevitable rise in traffic volume, please do have your say. <u>Please note that any previous comments are ignored so you will need</u> to resubmit your views. (More details on the consultation later – Ed).



A further date for your diary is Monday 28th April when we will hold our AGM at 10am at Doynton Village Hall.



# ENVIRONMENT Challenge for March

Make plans in Spring for your garden to improve biodiversity and especially insect numbers, as well as growing your own veg and fruit:



# TOP TIPS for encouraging more wildlife into your garden.

- <u>Have a small pond</u>: Even in a small garden, I use a small storage box for my pond. You'll be amazed how quickly wildlife finds a new pond. As well as being important for species such as amphibians and dragonflies who need the water to complete their life cycle, it will also be a vital source of drinking water for small animals, birds and insects.
- Be less tidyl: If you can resist tidying up so much and leave wilder areas of your garden with longer grass, leaf piles, log piles, and vegetation left uncut over the winter, these areas will provide really important habitats for a whole range of species.
- 3. Leave some grass long: You don't have to leave your whole lawn long, but is there an area that you could allow to grow long during the summer into a meadow habitat? Many insects such as butterflies and single bees lay their eggs on grasses so although less colourful, long grass is just as important as wild flowers. Also don't mow in May, and don't mow too short.
- Introduce a variety of plants: flowering at different times and with different flower shapes. This will ensure there is food available for pollinators throughout the year.
- 5. <u>Avoid using pesticides</u>: Insects can be really helpful to us if we start working with them rather than treating them as the enemy. If you can avoid the slug pellets and other pesticides, the beneficial insects will slowly build up and start to control those not so welcome guests. Garden birds, slow worms and hedgehogs can help to control slugs and snails. It may take a year or two for the balance to establish but it is worth being patient.

S Glos council are putting the final touches to a Local Plan to build more houses. The alternative to a cohesive plan is to have every development go through the planning permission system, which is costly and time-consuming.. Two new neighbourhoods with a total of 1,930 homes are planned for land east of the A4174 ring road between the B4465 and Carsons Road, while North Warmley New Neighbourhood will be created with 1,060 homes.

The plan said South Gloucestershire's population was forecast to increase to more than 350,000 over the next two decades, while 5,800 families were currently on the housing waiting list. The consultation period will open after full council approves the plan on February 12 before it is sent to the government's Planning Inspectorate for public examination in spring 2026.

## Introduction to your Parish safeguarding Officer

#### What is a Parish Safeguarding Officer?

Bristol Diocese takes safeguarding seriously and have created a volunteer role of Parish Safeguarding Officer. Good safeguarding practice requires there to be a lead person in each organisation who takes responsibility for supporting others in their organisation with good practice, this is the Parish Safeguarding Officer. The PCC recognise the volunteer role of Parish Safeguarding Officer who undertakes tasks for which the PCC is accountable.

The main responsibilities of the Parish Safeguarding Officer are:

- To support the PCC and Incumbent with reviewing the Parish safeguarding policies and procedures and ensuring their implementation.
- To communicate to the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer any safeguarding concern related to any minister, PCC member, staff member or volunteer to enable the Allegations Management procedure to be used.
- To communicate with the Diocesan Safeguarding Officer where any advice or support is required regarding reporting and management of any safeguarding issue in the Congregation.
- To work with the Incumbent to ensure support is provided for anyone involved with safeguarding issues in the parish as necessary.
- To be available for any child or adult to speak to regarding any concerns about a child or vulnerable adult. Including making themselves known to all in the Church and having their contact details and picture displayed within church premises.
- Ensure that DBS checks are carried out where appropriate and advise on training required for any volunteer roles within the Church.

#### Who is our Parish Safeguarding Officer?

Liz Butler. This is my picture. It is on display in all of our churches together with my contact details.

#### What did I do for a job before I retired?

I retired about 2 years ago. My working career was as an HR professional, primarily within the health and social care sector, working for charities who supported vulnerable adults. Part of this role was dealing with any



safeguarding alerts which may arise within the workplace from an employment law perspective. It also included recruitment and selection of staff and volunteers. I had responsibility for ensuring that all mandatory training was completed and accurately recorded for any CQC inspections.

#### Why do I volunteer in this role for the Church?

I have experience, from the workplace, of dealing with safeguarding, safer recruitment, DBS checks and managing a training database. This role is important from point of view of ensuring that the PCC is supported to undertake their responsibilities in relation to safeguarding. I have recent relevant background work experience and have completed all of my Diocesan training. I feel that everyone should take safeguarding seriously and be prepared to respond appropriately if necessary. This can be challenging if you do not have the relevant skillset. I can bring this to the role and support the PCC effectively. As a Christian I also feel that we should give back to the community we live in and use our skills for the good of the community.


#### What do I do outside church?
