

Wick Wildflower [& Biodiversity] Walk

The Wick Wildflower [& Biodiversity] Walk is between Parkers Avenue and St Anne's Drive. Over 40 wildflowers including Pyramidal orchids (*as in the picture*) at the western end, especially close to St Anne's Drive from June and many butterflies including Essex Skippers. It blossomed during the 2020 Lockdown when it was not cut until the Autumn.

The once a year cut by South Gloucestershire Council from the road using a Boom mower, followed by removal of the cuttings, has allowed this area to thrive. As the soil's fertility is reduced the wildflowers will dominate the grasses.

I remember many fields and banks being like this when I was young - we are lucky to have this area in Wick.

Several people responded to the question about what happens in the church calendar - this month, the first Sunday is Ascension Day, when Jesus, after his resurrection appearances, goes up to Heaven. He had gone visiting the disciples, proving that although people had seen him die, and watched him be buried, he was now fully alive and up and about. We don't celebrate it hugely, oddly - despite it being probably one of the most significant happenings.

The following Sunday is known as Pentecost - in the old days, Whitsun, or Whit Sunday. Pentecost is the day that the Holy Spirit came down on the disciples and enabled them to speak to many, many people in their native languages, despite the disciples being ordinary men with no language skills beforehand. It's where we get the phrase "speaking in tongues" from. It is the subject of many pieces of art, so choosing a picture for the front cover of this month's magazine was not easy!





Dyrham & Hinton Diversions

Women's Institute



On Saturday 10th May Dyrham and Hinton WI held a successful craft fair at the Village Hall. The community enjoyed browsing the local handmade crafts and indulged in a delicious spread of cakes, under a canopy of bunting.

For our May members meeting Bruce Gawler, our guest speaker and local resident, took us on a whistle stop tour of the Northwest Passage from Reykjavik in Iceland to Nome in Alaska. On board an Ultramarine Polar Cruise Ship this Polar expedition's first stop was the Pond Inlet, a remote community in the north of Baffin Island and we were informed about life in the high arctic where nothing, but mosses and lichens grow, the sea freezes for nine months a year and the average temperature in winter, when the sun does not rise for three months, is -34°C. Our next stop was at Beachy Island where three sailors from the disastrous Franklin expedition of 1845 are buried. We were told how, although the ships were provisioned for three years, all the 124 officers and crew eventually succumbed to disease and starvation. Finally we arrived at Nome in Alaska where, during the exceedingly severe winter of 1925, a diphtheria outbreak was controlled by the delivery of serum from Anchorage by a relay of heroic mushers who braved whiteout blizzard conditions with winds up to 80 mph and a wind chill of -65°C to deliver the serum to Nome; a distance of 674 miles which they covered in 127 hours.

Wick Football Club



The **first team** have ended an amazing season finishing in fourth place only four points behind champions Almondsbury, when only coming onboard three weeks before the start of the season. This was a brand-new management team and squad. They managed to score eighty nine goals, the highest any Wick side has ever scored in the Marcliff Glous County League. This was largely down to Cory Langdon, who scored forty-three goals in all competitions, playing in only thirty-two games. His league record, scoring thirty-seven goals in the league, thirteen assists in twenty-seven games. Only six other players have scored more goals in a season since the Marcliff Glous county league was formed in 1968/1969. This is a magnificent achievement, and we are hoping Cory remains a Wick player for next seasons push for Step 6 promotion. It's not just down to one player, the whole squad have been superb and have gained valuable experience at County level. We really pleased that our management trio of Callum Fudgell, Josh Brown and Ben Mackenzie have committed to Wick for next season and they are already starting to plan for the new campaign.

A big well done to our **Reserve side** who finished in fifth spot also in their first season at the club and were unfortunate to just miss out on a promotion spot, the gap of six weeks with no games during February and March didn't help. Under the guidance of Dom Summers, supported by Ash Jenkins, the lads have adjusted superbly to the Bristol & District league and are keen to go one better next season and go for promotion. Their top goalscorer was Callum Whooley with thirteen goals with Brea Williams close behind with eight.

Our **Sunday team** have had another very successful season, with Keane Ashwood bagging twelve from midfield as their top goalscorer. They have finished league runners up for the second year running and won the league cup again beating Bristol Academia 3-0 with goals from Tyler Dacres x2 & Tyrece Carter.

The **Vets** went one better and **won their league cup final** on Sunday 18th May, beating Bury Legends 5-0, thanks to two goals from Mark Cook, Johnny Williams, Steve Jones and top goalscorer Tim O'Loughlin having already secured the league title after losing only one game all season, under the guidance of Paul Bond.

With this success the squad have completed the league and cup double for successive year, which has never been done in the league's history. Tim O'Loughlin scored eleven goals in six games with keepers Barry Werett and Kev Sibley keeping six clean sheets in twelve games between them.

ENVIRONMENT Challenge for June



How has your NO MOW May been? Have you seen insects in the grass and flowers?

It's been so dry that the grass has hardly grown anyway. The Met Office say that it has been the driest Spring for 100 years. We have seen the grass go brown, the soil crack and farmer's crops starting to wilt in the fields.

A dry Spring has an impact on our water reservoirs and boreholes. Some places in the UK are in a worse situation than us in the South West.

What can we do to help? **REDUCE** our water use:

Save water, save money

In summer, we tend to use more water – mainly for watering the garden. A few simple steps can help you use less water.

1. Choose super-saver showers – have a shower rather than a bath and keep it short and sweet – play a favourite song and see if you can be out before it finishes. A family of four could save around £210 a year in water and energy costs if everyone cut their daily shower by two minutes.
2. Get a water butt – collect rainwater from your roof to keep your garden green. Bonus - many plants prefer rainwater, which has a different acidity level to tap water. The average UK house roof could collect enough to fill 450 water butts a year.
3. Fix your leaky loo. Many dual-flush toilets develop a trickle of water against the back. It might look tiny, but a 24/7 leak really adds up over time. Get the valve repaired to save up to £480 a year.
4. Wash your car with a bucket and sponge, rather than a hose pipe

5. Put the hosepipe down and grab a watering can. It may take a bit longer, but you'll find you waste a lot less water, targeting only the areas/plants that need watering.
6. Mow your grass long, on a higher setting, to keep the moisture in. Good for insects too. Then less need for watering.

'Capturing Memories'

'One thing I learned from caring for a relative with dementia was to allow them to retrieve what they could from their younger days and to share in those memories. I now have such a greater understanding of their early life to cherish. I found this enriched us both and gave a common ground for chatting.'

This lovely and insightful comment is from a supporter of the Memory Cafe at Doynton.

One way of beginning such a conversation is by bringing together a few items relevant to the person's life in a 'Memory Box'. There is no need for a special box - a shoebox or similar is fine - and the contents can be anything which will help to provoke a good memory - items which stimulate the senses such as soap, flowers for scent; textures for touch; visually familiar items and photos from the past and music are all ideal.

Items might reflect a career, service or hobby; places visited or experiences enjoyed; family, friends and pets.... the list is endless and the memories are priceless...

We plan to look at the idea of Memory Boxes at a Memory Cafe in the future. More immediately in June our cafe will focus on animals and pets in particular and in July we will have gentle sports and games to play.

Our cafe meets on the first Thursday of each month from 2-4pm at Doynton Village Hall. All those living with dementia or memory loss, together with their family member or carer, are very welcome.'




