



News from St Bartholomew's

The native hedgerow at the back of the churchyard should be going in this month, and we very much hope that it will form part of a "Wildlife corridor". The birds are there for about 100 days, then they are off, staying airborne until they come back for another breeding season, which is astonishing! We are coming into the season of Remembrance, and warmly invite you to any of the services around the benefice - details are on the centre pages, as always. Here at St Bartholomew's, we have a "Church Parade" where the youngsters of the Uniformed Organisations present their colours, and take part in the service, which is always very good to see; the younger generations Will Not Forget the sacrifices made on our behalf. Doynton Playing Field: the fund-raising event on Saturday November 15th is **cancelled**: a date for an event in Spring/Summer 2026 will be advised in due course.


Holy Trinity church: the heating in our church has broken down and the Parochial Church Council has decided to replace it with a more ecofriendly electric system. After much deliberation, advice and visiting churches that had examples of the system we were considering, we have chosen to go ahead with the "halo heating" system [How appropriate – Ed.]. This takes the form of rings of heaters suspended from the roof, and should heat up the church in just one hour. We would need up to six heaters through the centre of the church. 


Our Christmas meal this year will be at Kendleshire Golf Club on Wednesday 3 December, which we look forward to.





The date for this is now confirmed as Saturday 8th November. We'll get together around 10.00, have a cuppa tea and a discussion, and then get stuck in! You



Dyrham & Hinton Diversions

Women's Institute

For our October meeting Richard Rickitt, one of the UK's best-known beekeepers and co-editor of BeeCraft magazine, captivated members from start to finish with his fascinating talk on gardening for Bees. His informative talk made us think about how we can help save the bee species by creating a pollinator oasis in our gardens or



window boxes and planting blue and purple species of flowers to attract bees. Early snowdrops, mahonia, hellebores and crocuses are a good nectar spring source for queen bees to establish a nest. Richard highlighted that our bee pollinators are in peril; bumblebees, solitary bees and honeybees are all under threat from the modern-day onslaught of pesticides, habitat loss, and intensive agriculture. Yet between them, the almost 300-species of UK bee, along with other pollinators, are responsible for more than a third of everything we eat. The infiltration of imported fake honey has impacted the decline of UK beekeeping and the bee population due to fewer hives being financially viable to maintain. As individuals we can make a difference; letting some areas grow wild, buying locally sourced honey and asking our local councils to grow more bee friendly plants and trees. 
