



From the Revd. Steve Britton.

Occasionally, when we run out of something at home, I will take a walk to our local Co-op, and if they have got what I want it's fine, but there also Lidl, Aldi and Marks and Spencer nearby as well. Now the barcodes on the packets that are scanned at the checkouts are the same for all the supermarkets. One system, understood and used by all the different supermarkets, which makes things a lot easier. Imagine if each supermarket chain had its own unique barcode and they all had be put on a tube of toothpaste to enable it to be scanned! So supermarkets all co-operate together about how to use barcodes on packaging.

And I was thinking that maybe we should be co-operating together like the supermarkets do. Because on a basic level, the supermarkets are all doing the same sort of thing. They are all selling us the food we need. And we, in churches, are doing the same sort of thing. We are all worshipping God together.

But we have a tendency to want everybody else to conform with *our* system of worship. Singing in the style we like. Taking communion as we do. We do not recognise what each other does. Just to illustrate what I mean, how big a stretch of your imagination would it be for this to be happening in a church near you?

Can you imagine in your wildest dreams the vicar of one church saying to a visitor "If you don't find our ritual comforting, if the incense starts off your asthma, you might find the local URC or Methodists chapel down the road a little more comfortable. Oh and our adjoining parish church has a worship band that isn't too bad - if you like that sort of thing - choose one to try, and I'll take you down there and introduce you to their minister".

I guess the problem is, some Christians see the differences between the ways of doing things as being the difference between being blessed, and having everlasting life ... or not.

And I'm not sure what I'm trying to say here, apart from "Have you heard the one about One church, One faith and One Lord?"



Evening beauties and night delights

Long before flowering plants developed, there were flying insects feeding during dusk and nighttime on substances produced by plants.

2500 different examples of these insects occur in the UK. They are responsible for 10% of crop pollination. These insects range more widely than bees and butterflies and are very efficient pollinators.

During the day to avoid the attention of predators they keep still, often

with their wings open and flat, unlike butterflies. They rely on blending in with their background. An example is the Peppered moth, shown here.

Others fold their wings, such as the Bufftip moth, which looks like a broken Birch

twig. Many are beautifully marked and easily as colourful as butterflies, such as the Elephant hawkmoth. Finding their way around at night involves using the light of the moon. Unfortunately, streetlights and our outdoor lights, especially LEDs, confuse them, and some land nearby when exhausted by flying in circles and can be seen in the morning.

During October, 50 or so of these insects will be flying in the evenings and at night in the Parish News area. The "What's Flying Tonight" app, available from the Butterfly Conservation website, will provide a list of them. Fixing a white sheet over a washing line at night and shining a bright light on it is one way to observe and identify these night shift pollinators. The RSPB website has other methods of trapping moths so they can be observed/photographed/identified before being released.

ENVIRONMENT CHALLENGE October 2025

Friday, September 19th.

I am sitting at breakfast looking out on my garden on a glorious, blue sky, September morning. The grass is bright green after the brown of the long dry summer. Trees in the distance are beginning to change colour. My sunflowers bright yellow against the red of



rosehips, and red of the Virginia creeper. Blue tits are madly feeding on the peanuts; Jackdaws on the roof opposite examining their nest site in the chimney stack. Unbelievably beautiful, and calming just to sit for a moment and look.

There is a famous poem, by WH Davies, which has the opening lines:

What is this life if, full of care? We have no time to stand and stare. No time to stand beneath the boughs And stare as long as sheep or cows. No time to see, when woods we pass, Where squirrels hide their nuts in grass. No time to see, in broad daylight, Streams full of stars, like skies at night.

We are so fortunate to live in Wick, Doynton or Dyrham and have the chance to enjoy the countryside, the peace and calm of the trees and fields and river. In Wick, take a walk to the top of Brockwell Park, sit and admire the amazing view. Wander into the Nature Reserve by the sparkling river, see a flash of a Kingfisher if you're lucky. Be amazed at the recovery of the trees and bushes after the cutting of Ash trees in February.

Nature is so re-generative. (Remember that the Nature Reserve by the river used to be a busy factory until the 1970's, and what you see now is just natural growth) So let us enjoy it and keep it clean and good for all the generations to come.

Yesterday, I walked the Cotswold Way from Cold Ashton to Prospect Stile. 6 miles down and up with views over the Avon and Severn Valleys- Stunning. This time (I do it every month), accompanied by a person in an off-road wheel chair to see if the paths could be more accessible. What a privilege to consider how to make our beautiful country-side and environment open to ALL people.

My challenge this month is for you too: Take time to go out and walk, sit and enjoy what God has created. The WH Davies poem ends with these words:

A poor life this, if full of care, We have no time to stand and stare.


A relaxed, informal and **free** drop in café, providing support for people with dementia along with a family member, carer, or friend.




