

Next on the agenda is the wildflower plug planting - by the time you get this issue, we will have hopefully planted an area of the field at the back of church, with the help of some of the children from school. Safeguarding Sunday November 30th 2025

On the 5th Sunday in the month Rev. Elaine covered the topic of safeguarding. Why is this important, I hear you ask? We don't get many children at church so why should we worry? We live in small villages, we all look out for each other and know everyone, so it's not relevant. Why has she done this?

Firstly, safeguarding is not just about children. It is about anyone who is vulnerable. Adults can become vulnerable e.g. bereavement, difficult family circumstances, illness as they age. By definition children and those with disabilities will be more reliant on others so therefore more at risk of abuse and more vulnerable. We think we know everyone in our community, but does this make it more difficult to ask for help? The statistics on abuse are frightening in the UK.

Approximately 1 in 4 women have experienced abuse since the age of 16 in the UK (2024). This does not mean that it is happening within the confines of the church, but may be happening within our community or our church community.

Figures from 2024 identified that 3 in 10 adults had experienced some kind of abuse before the age of 18.

Figures for men are 3%. This could be much higher due to them not feeling able to come forward.

If you look around you and count the number of people (in church today/workplace) and consider these figures chances are that you know someone who has been subjected to abuse. Also, I doubt that any of these individuals have mentioned it to you. Would you mention it to someone if it was you?

The impact of abuse on an individual's life is huge e.g. trust, relationship problems, living in fear, mental health, physical health. Therefore, it is important that we all look out for each other and support individuals if they need help. Within the church community the Parish Safeguarding Officer is there to support and advise should you be concerned about anyone. Within the school environment you should speak to the Head of School (Designated Safeguarding Lead) if you are concerned about one of the children.

The Church of England has worked hard to raise the profile of

safeguarding.

At a local level we have robust procedures, our PCC members are trained and aware of their responsibilities in this area. The 5 churches in our benefice have a Parish Safeguarding Officer who is responsible for dealing with any concerns raised in relation to safeguarding.

In future articles we will be looking at ways that we can support the vulnerable within our community.

Christmas Greenery: Holly, Ivy and Mistletoe



Holly has shiny prickly green leaves and bright red berries, further up the bush the leaves become smooth. The berries feed birds like blackbirds and thrushes in winter. People traditionally decorate homes with holly at Christmas. In the past, holly leaves were made into tea to

treat fevers, though the berries are poisonous to humans.

Ivy climbs walls and trees with its twisting stems providing homes to many creatures. It flowers in autumn when few other plants do, its nectar feeds bees, moths and butterflies. Its berries feed birds like the mistle thrush. Ivy is used in wreaths and garlands for winter festivals. Ivy leaves have been




used in cough medicines to help clear the chest., and can be boiled to create a gentle detergent.



Mistletoe grows on tree branches, not in the ground. It's a parasite that takes nutrients from its host tree. Its berries feed birds like the mistle thrush. People hang mistletoe at Christmas for good luck and kisses. Mistletoe has been used in herbal medicine to help with high blood pressure and improve circulation.

All three symbolize life and the promise of Spring. Walter Wildflower.
