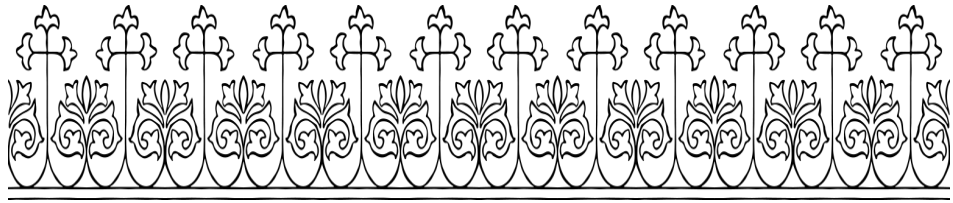

- **Brockwell Park play area:** After 5 months of design considerations, the PC has agreed a final layout for the new look play area. This will include the removal of the steel climbing frame (*anyone want it? - Ed*), relocation of the rocks, installation of a new, pirate ship themed, climbing frame with landing stage, scrambling net and slide, a new smaller child play unit, relocation of the log seats to provide a gapped barrier to the swings area, and extensions with an additional entrance gate to the perimeter fence to enclose all the equipment including the crocodile see-saw and tree gym.

The play area will be closed and out of bounds partly and fully throughout June this year to accommodate the works and be open again in time for the school holidays and Party in the Park.

The works are funded by the remains of a surplus built up over many years of £40k, a community infrastructure levy of £9k, and a part VAT refund, totalling around £55k. This is the biggest investment in parish facilities by the PC since the new toilets at the village hall some 5 years ago.

(The new pirate ship will need a name; to date, Black Pig, Bounty and Skylark have been suggested so if you or your youngsters have a suitable name, please let the Clerk know – arrrrr, Ed.)

- **Grants:** Wick Brownies: £350 for new outside storage for games kit.
- **Planning applications:**
P26/00489/LB & P26/000512/F Rose & Crown, High Street, Wick: listed buildings & planning consent for major refurbishment of pub exterior & interior, new external seating at front, new signage, new external chilled storage unit at rear – *objection: no plan to attenuate noise of external chilled storage unit to avoid public nuisance. No other objections.*

Wick Sports Ground

With the pitches and clubhouse looking glorious, WSG still has to battle with some legacy issues. The original clubhouse was a wood built structure, which began to decay over time, including losing its roof in the great storm of 1987. Much like Triggers broom, today it is the same building albeit its roof, floor and walls have been replaced, and the internal layout changed. What we haven't been able to update is our sewage waste system, which needs much tlc, and which empties into our old cesspit, plus our water supply pipe, which runs over 300m through neighbouring farmland and somewhere under Oldbury Lane to our meter. Originally without a water supply, water was fetched from local cottages well into the 60's, so we believe our supply was connected to the mains late 60's. This pipe has become embrittled, and we have suffered a series of failures in recent years. As Bristol Water have declined to move our meter, WSG are responsible for the supply pipe and any loss of water, repairs to and replacement of it. The huge cost of its replacement requires us to manage the situation as best we can, but this can only be a short-term solution. So despite the new looks, please spare a thought for the volunteers who work continuously to keep the sports ground operational and looking good.

Friday Night Opening – Our last Friday in the month opening is still proving popular. Not only does it provide a warm welcoming place for locals and friends to meet, it helps to fund our continual development of the Sports Ground. It's **Friday 29th May**, doors open from 5pm. Come and join us.

Environment challenge for MAY



Did you know? The UK is home to 59 different kinds of butterflies and around 270 types of wild bees - including 24 kinds of bumblebees!

They need a place to survive!

No Mow May is an encouragement to gardeners to stop mowing in May to allow wildflowers to bloom, and support pollinators like bees and butterflies to have food and live. By leaving lawns uncut, residents help boost urban biodiversity and create crucial habitats. Especially in May.

Here's some more thoughtful advice for your lawn.....[.....](#)

To maximize benefits for insects, a **varied lawn height** is ideal, but generally, allowing grass to grow **longer**—between 2.5cm and 10cm (1–4 inches) or **higher**—is significantly more beneficial than a short, manicured lawn. Longer grass acts as a "mini-jungle" for spiders, beetles, and grasshoppers, while also allowing flowers like clover and daisy to bloom, providing vital food for pollinators like bees and butterflies.

During the summer leave some areas of grass for much longer between mows or small areas let it just grow until autumn.

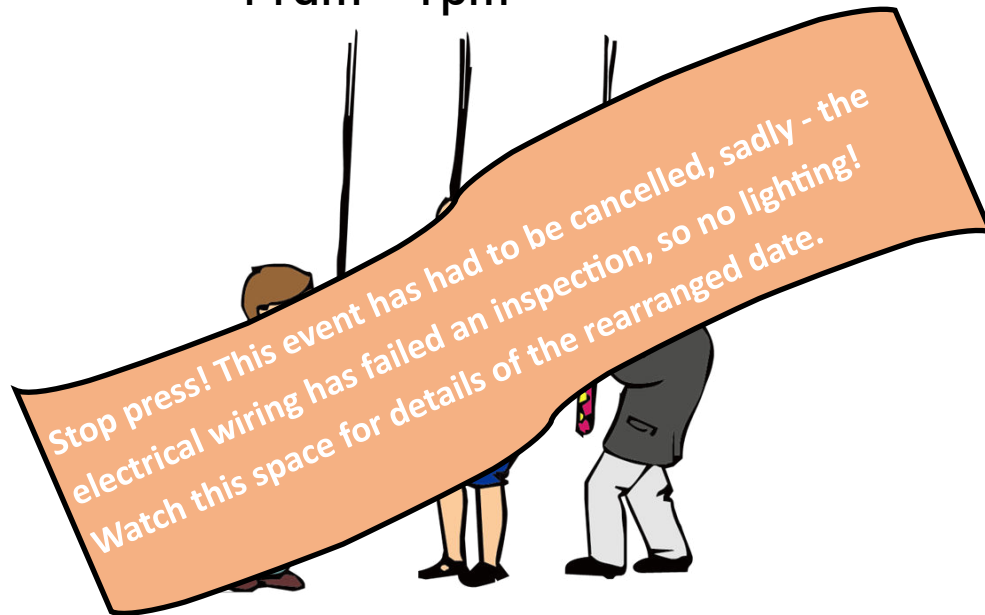

The Red Kite: A Sky High Success Story

The **Red Kite** is one of the most beautiful birds you can spot in the British countryside. You can recognize them easily by their bright reddish-brown feathers and their amazing **forked tails**, which look like a giant "V" cut out of the end. They use these tails like a rudder on a boat to twist and turn through the air with hardly any effort at all.

For a long time, these birds were very rare, but people worked hard to protect them. Now, you can often see them gliding over our woods and fields. They are scavengers, which means they mostly look for food that is already dead, like roadkill, or they catch small creatures like worms and mice.

- **Fancy Nests:** Red Kites love to decorate! They often pick up strange things to put in their nests, like old socks, crisp packets, or even soft toys.
- **Social Flyers:** Unlike some birds of prey that like to be alone, Red Kites are quite friendly and will often roost together in large groups during the winter.
- **Lazy Hunters:** Because they are so good at gliding, they can spend all day in the air without getting tired, just waiting for a tasty snack to appear below.
- **Wingspan:** from 5 foot 9 inches to 6 foot 5 inches.
- **High Pitch:** Despite being big and impressive, they don't have a scary roar; they actually make a thin, high-pitched whistling sound.

Keep your eyes on the clouds—you might just see one or two circling above.

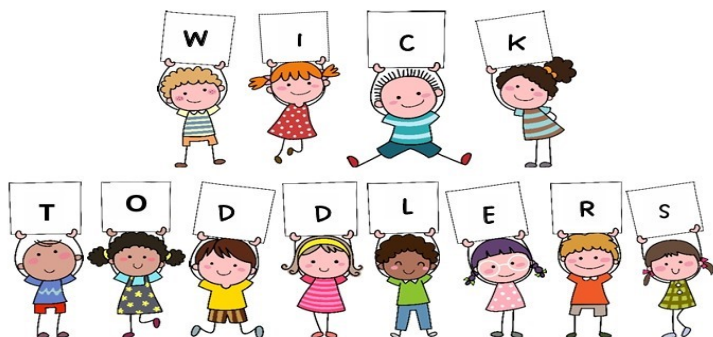
